January 2020

We started out the year of 2020 with a fantastic program for the community led by long time diversity educator and facilitator, Jean Fei, "Making the Invisible Visible- Exploring Poverty, Racism and Discrimination." Jean helped all the participants to see things differently and to have a much better understanding of poverty and how deeply the roots are formed.

Youth² **Members Jon and Olivia Brayton, Ella Daley and Bev** hosted a booth for the Opening Reception of MLK Saratoga weekend.

A key goal of our strategic plan is to build an interactive website and social marketing plan for Youth². We are re searching avenues to assist with this goal.




February 2020

Youth² Founder **Beverly Lazar Davis** and two youth Board Members, **Olivia Venditti and Ella Daley** attending the very first **Youth Empowerment and Sustainability Summit** (YESS) at the Ashokan Center in Olive Bridge, NY. This Summit involved nearly 150 youth who attended workshops on climate justice, communicating about climate issues, how local action can contribute to global solutions, on plant based diets, on the impact of fashion, on biomimicry, on supporting green teams, pollinator gardens and creating climate action plans.

We received updates about our **Flint Water Fund 2019** effort and how the Flint, Michigan government is helping thousands of children affected by lead poisoning.





We were updating our **Book of Good Deeds**, outlining youth volunteer opportunities; but put this on hold as COVID impacts volunteerism. Likewise, our follow-up **Grant Writing Training** was put on hold.

March 2020-

<u>Community Service Incentive Award Scholarships</u> were distributed to 5 schools in Ballston Spa, Schuylerville and Saratoga Springs.

Thanks **Olivia Venditti's** grant writing we received \$1,500.00 from **Stewart's Shops Holiday Match**.

April 2020-

April is usually a busy month for Youth^{2.} Unfortunately the COVID Pandemic resulted in the cancellation of:

May 2020-



June 2020

We celebrated two of our graduating seniors, **Amalia Culpepper-Wehr and Mimi Van Patten**, masked, in a safe and distant manner. **Andre Culpepper-Wehr and Mimi Van Patten** developed the <u>"Call to Action"</u> poster. **Eliza Krackeler and Amalia Culpepper-Wehr** wrote press releases and **Eliza** hung the poster in places in our community to encourage youth to make positive changes in our world.







2020 Student Courage Award Recipients

Amalia Culpepper-Wehr is a senior at Saratoga Springs High School where her many interests are reflected in her involvement with a variety of activities.

As one of the few minority students at her school, Amalia became increasingly aware of the awkwardness in discussing race at school, which led to her creating a space in which students could explore and discuss Black issues. At the beginning of her sophomore year she wrote a proposal, found an advisor, and formed the African American Studies Club. She has hosted guest speakers, led discussions, and collaborated with other clubs to have meaningful activities. Last year she proposed and coordinated a staff development session on addressing complex issues of diversity in the classroom. Amalia, along with other student members, led discussion groups for more than 170 faculty members.

Amalia's involvement in other activities is equally inspiring. She is committed to issues of social justice and improving her school environment and community. She was invited by the Amnesty International chapter to speak on the topic of race and racism to more than 200 staff members and students at her school. She collaborated with her English teacher on units relating to racism when discussing To Kill a Mockingbird and Of Mice and Mar. She assisted in planning an MLK morning of service activity with Youth Squared, where she is on the board.

"Amalia embodies everything this award represents," said her nominator, "extraordinary leadership skills, being a spokesperson for tolerance, standing up against hate and violence, and she has engaged in increasing tolerance and educating others about racism."

November 2020-

Jenna Cuilla, Senior Philanthropic Officer from the Community Foundation for the Greater Capital Region, educated our Board explaining our Field of Interest Fund, our Fund Balance, our responsibilities of Board Members. Youth² teaches philanthropic skills to youth, including financial and Board governance.

December 2020-

Youth² has been asked to transform the **Trail Blazing Volunteer Training** to a virtual program. **Kiara Nagel, creative consultant** for social change work is a fan of Youth². She has worked in the field as a trainer with the Interaction Institute for Social Change and has donated her services to help us with this effort. Our goal is to have a viable training for students during MLK Saratoga weekend in January 2021.



Pandemic Efforts.


Youth² is committed to help with food security, education equity, racial justice, mental health, environmental action, community service education and having every voice, both young and old, be heard.

- ~Immediately, Youth² looked to our community and assisted with food security by donating \$5000 to the Franklin Community Center who was a major actor in distributing food to families locally.
- ~We wrote a <u>Black Lives Matter statement</u> from the Advisory Board. Then promptly researched <u>regional efforts for racial justice and donated \$1000 to Cocoa House, Inc. in Schenectady, NY and \$1000 to the Arts Business Collaborative, Inc. for the Okra Project, New York City. A group of us participated in the <u>Saratoga March Against Racism and Police Brutality</u> in Congress Park.</u>
- "ConnectionKits"- \$500 grant award to Olivia Venditti, Youth Grant Assistant with Katelyn Brunet from the Saratoga County Mental Health Center
 These kits will be distributed to youth and family populations to increase family connectedness, introduce fun into family routine, support positive parenting efforts, increase skill building and improve confidence and positive self-care, and reduce anxiety. Please let us know if you want to donate to these kits.
- ~Eliza Krackeler and Olivia Venditti are making virtual story time videos for the Southern Adirondack Library System.

We donated **\$500 to the "Back to School with Wellspring"** cause, bringing **education equity** to 10 youth needing educational supplies.



Olivia Venditti, Ella Daley, Eva Nagel and Beverly Lazar Davis created our Composting Subcommittee. We are interviewing people in the community who are interested in making composting available to many, reducing the second biggest greenhouse gas emission of Methane. We are committed to educating and to helping others to compost.



We offer the 3.5-hour Trailblazing Volunteer Training for any school, youth group or organization with a minimum participation of 25-35 students. This training: highlights the value of volunteering and why people take part in social action, helps students think about something that they want to do to improve their local community or the world, and identify how to realize their vision. Students' creativity is stirred as they explore ways to make volunteer work meaningful to them and match their interests. Many on our Advisory Board are working with Kiara Nagel on transforming the "Trail Blazing Volunteer Training" program to a virtual platform.
